VOICES FOR CHANGE: A CLIMATE JUSTICE ADVOCACY

The Strategic Partnership Agreement (SPAII) implementing partners comprising of MEMPROW, ActionAid International Uganda, VIJANA CORPS, COTA, and other like-minded partners like Climate Action Network, PELUM, etc., from 29 April to 17th May hosted a long campaign aimed at advancing climate justice. Entitled "From Words to Action," the initiative brought together diverse stakeholders, including policymakers, activists, and experts, to discuss and address pressing climate challenges.

A core theme throughout the period was empowering marginalized communities, with a particular emphasis on women and girls. This focus acknowledges the disproportionate impact of climate change on these groups.

Key events included Local Action activities by all partners, media engagements, a solidarity Climate Justice Walk, and the National Symposium with a launch of a global campaign titled "Fund Our Future."

Key Recommendations:

The National Climate Justice Symposium, a central event of the campaign, yielded key recommendations:

- Integrate climate justice principles, including gender equity, into policy frameworks at all levels.
- Support community-led initiatives, particularly those women-driven, to address climate challenges.
- Strengthen climate education and awareness programs, ensuring accessibility for women and girls.
- Foster collaboration across sectors, including women's rights organizations, to create effective climate action strategies.

The symposium also addressed regional concerns. A key recommendation was to enhance the East African Community's (EAC) capacity for climate projects that specifically benefit women and girls.

This Climate Justice Week underscored the critical role of women and girls in achieving climate justice. By empowering these communities and integrating their voices into policy and action, a more equitable and sustainable future can be secured.



Pakwach, Uganda (June 14th, 2024): MEMPROW, in partnership with local stakeholders, NGOs, and schools, leveraged the Day of the African Child (DAC) to champion girls' education and advocate for an end to child marriage.

Themed "Education for All Children in Africa," the DAC served as a springboard for our ongoing initiative, "Her Voice: Second Chance Education for Child Mothers Project." Over 300 participants, including students, educators, government officials, and community leaders, marched through Pakwach's main streets, raising awareness about the challenges child mothers face in accessing education.

Policy Engagement and Bridging the Gap:

The District Education Officer (DEO) highlighted the national policy allowing teenage mothers to re-enroll in school, acknowledging the existing framework for educational access. However, she also addressed the need to bridge the gap between policy and implementation, citing cultural and religious beliefs as significant barriers. This ignited a call to action to dismantle these barriers and foster a more inclusive educational environment that prioritizes girls' education.

Education: A Catalyst for Empowerment:

Student performances served as powerful advocacy tools, portraying the journeys of children and child mothers striving for education. These performances showcased the power of education, promoting gender equality and contributing to the achievement of sustainable development goals.



COMBATING SEXUAL GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE USING TRAUMA SENSITIVE TRAINING FOR POLICE

Recently in West Nile, Uganda, we continued with the fight against sexual gender-based violence (SGBV) through a training program for police officers. This initiative focused on a trauma-sensitive approach, aiming to improve the well-being of officers while creating a supportive environment for SGBV survivors.

The training equipped 40 police officers with the skills and knowledge to employ a trauma-sensitive approach when interacting with SGBV survivors. This approach fosters a safe and supportive space for survivors to report abuse and access essential services.

Our efforts go beyond training. by establishing a trauma-sensitive approach within the police



force, we hope to build a solid support system. This system would ideally provide counseling and legal assistance to both survivors of SGBV and the officers who serve them.

We present a snapshot of our progress in the first half of the year. Through collaborative efforts, we've directly engaged 2,586 individuals across all operational districts within our various programs.


